

Preservation of Documents (Historical Institutions) Act (N.I.) 2022

Recommendation 4A of the Truth Recovery Design Panel's Report

"An immediate statutory preservation order guaranteeing the protection of all relevant records until they are gathered.

This requirement should extend to all **State and non-State** institutions and agencies, officials, representatives and professionals that serviced them."



- Charitable organisations
- Voluntary Adoption Agencies with 'inherited' records











Phase 1 – Archive Survey

The survey identified >4,500 items:

- Over 200 registers
- Over 2000 index cards relating to individuals
- Over 2000 case files relating to individuals
- Other administrative or 'corporate' information














Phase 2 - Pilot Project

- Develop acquisition strategy
- Prepare documentation
 - Options for deposit
 - Private Deposit Agreements
- Arrange meetings
- Negotiate access
- Establish operational team
- Create operational workflows



Register, (1880s-1940s), before and after conservation treatment











Phase 2 - Operational Progress



- Team expansion
- Need for research support
- Need for dedicated Project
 Conservator
- Workflow developed











Phase 3 - Full project

Options for preservation

- Transfer original documents to PRONI (indefinite loan)
- PRONI digitise the collection and retain a digital copy
- PRONI digitise the collection, record holder agrees to retain and actively preserve a digital copy

Options for digitisation

- Temporary deposit records digitised in PRONI, Belfast
- PRONI team digitise records at the record holder's premises

Options regarding access for investigation

- Individually tailored Data Sharing Agreements
- Full access to Panel researchers
- Redacted access to Panel researchers

Phase 3 - Full project

Several organisations have now deposited records, including:

- Church of Ireland
- Roman Catholic Parishes
- Religious Orders
- Adoption Agencies
- Church & charitable organisations


Over 5,500 records received to date
Over 50,000 digitized images created to date

Records of all N. Irish Mother and Baby Institutions secured = names of c.10,500 women and girls

Records of all four N. Irish Magdalene Laundries secured = names of c.3,500 women and girls

Parish Register containing relevant baptism entries (1890-1963)










Phase 3 - Engagement with Victims & Survivors

Current and ongoing archival work

- Records from official sources have been surveyed, e.g. Health Trusts, Courts Service:
 - 18,000 adoption case files
 - Adoption court files
- Records relating to pathways and practices e.g. baby 'homes', burial and cemetery records, etc.
- Statutory Public Inquiry and Redress Service Bill being scrutinized by MLAs; Standardised Redress payment scheme imminent
- The Truth Recovery Independent Panel final report due by 31st March 2026.

Use of language and terminology

- 'Victims and survivors' affected person
- 'Home' institution
- Mother / Birth Mother
- Care, providing refuge
- 'Illegitimate' nonmarital birth
- 'Girls' infantilising women
- 1st offence, 2nd offence pregnancy as crime
- 'Name in class'/house name

Language used to describe individuals

- Comments regarding low IQ or intelligence
- Derogatory comments about personality or appearance
- Comments about the company they keep, promiscuity, lack of morals, etc.











Truth Recovery Archive

Establishment and operation of an 'Independent Archive'

"Measures to ensure access to records: a statutory preservation requirement; data protection law implementation guidance; and legislation to establish a permanent, dedicated, independent truth-telling archive;" [Truth, Acknowledgement and Accountability Report, 2021]
